


Work on brick oven and patio area completed

Every day brings new experiences... and pride

Over the past few years, Niskayuna High School's Community Transition Program has given students the opportunity to earn real-life experience at SUNY SCCC. Under the supervision of John Leclerc, Teacher and Coordinator of the program, high school students are being incorporated into both community workplaces and sites here on campus while learning essential life skills including time and money management.

"Everyone has been great with all of our students and the different work sites," Leclerc said. "It's just been fantastic."

The program started in 2012 when a few students form Niskayuna High School were brought over to work in the Begley Library. Shortly after that, Leclerc decided to expand the idea into a larger program. "Three years ago, we started spending our afternoons down here," Leclerc said. "So our students would spend the morning taking a couple of classes at Niskayuna High School, they would work somewhere in the community during the day, and then we would take a small group of students on campus here in the afternoons for a couple of hours." In December 2015, Leclerc, College and Niskayuna administrators decided that they wanted to do even more for these students and the program soon became full time.

"Students get here at about 7:45 in the morning," Leclerc explained. "We typically start with a journal entry. They have personal calendar books, so we work on time management and those sort of things. We also work on money management and budgeting, and that's all from about 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. Then, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., students will work at a community worksite." Two students work at a retirement home in Niskayuna, another works at Panera Bread, and a couple other students work at a library. Students also help out on campus by delivering mail and assisting in the College Store.

Feedback for the program has been very positive, both from students and parents. "The students really enjoy the program," Leclerc said. "I think they take a lot of pride in saying that they go to school at SCCC even though they aren't matriculated students. They love that they've been able to move on from high school."



Presenting on the art of presenting

Caroline Buff, Research and Instruction Librarian, Siu Ng, Director of Academic Services, and Alicia Richardson, Associate Professor in the Liberal Arts Division, delivered a presentation titled, "When Writers Speak: Collaborating on Teaching Students Presentation Skills" at the Annual Conference of the Two-Year College English Association in Hartford, Conn., earlier this month.

The session addressed the way in which academic departments can authentically collaborate to provide students with a model for effective and engaging oral presentations. Head Coach talks new season, importance of discipline

In this Q. and A. conducted by student writer Noah Smith, Paralegal major, Harry Rolle, new Head Coach of the Men's Basketball Team, discusses his strategy for the season and what's important on *and* off the court.

Noah Smith: What are some of your philosophies when coaching a team?

Coach Harry Rolle: First and foremost is having discipline. I mean teaching basketball along with life, discipline comes first. You need discipline to handle your studies the same way you need discipline to learn the game of basketball in order to play the game, and to be successful.

Noah S.: What are you planning on focusing on more, being aggressive or more defensive oriented?

Coach R.: Being aggressive *and* defensive. We're doing both at the same time.

Noah S.: What kind of things do you expect from your players?

Coach R.: I expect them to be on time, I expect them to listen to coaching and I expect them to be a student, number one. You cannot play here unless you take care of your business in the classroom. If you can't do that, then you can't play for us. That comes number one and I won't be afraid to sit a player down if he's not doing the things he needs to do. If he's missing a couple of classes then he has to sit. That comes first.

Noah S.: So, what sparked your interest in this sport?

Coach R.: Well, to be honest, my favorite sports were football and baseball. I grew up in New York City, so when I started playing, basketball was the only sport that you could work on or play by yourself. Once I started to learn and play with other kids that was pretty much a culture in New York City. I've been serious about basketball ever since.

Noah S.: Are there any teams you're worried about or looking forward to facing this season?

Coach R.: I'm looking forward to facing all of them. I'm not the type of coach who's going to say, "We're worried about this team or that team." I'm more worried about my team than the other team. I can't wait for all of them.

Noah S.: Any particular goals for the season?

Coach R.: My number one goal is just to gain respect from everyone; to gain respect from the naysayers that say that guys can't pass classes. On the court, there are guys who know we've been at the bottom for the past couple of years, so I want to change their minds also.

About Coach Harry Rolle

Harry Rolle, Head Coach of the Men's Basketball Team, first picked up a basketball in fifth grade at PS 206 in New York City. He has been coaching Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) teams in the Capital Region since 2004, the same year he started as Assistant Coach for the SUNY SCCC Women's Basketball Team serving until 2006. He coaches Team Albany, a Northeast traveling team. He has also coached for the Albany City School District and at Notre Dame-Bishop Gibbons.


