Learning Center/Writing Lab, Elston 523

Guidance by professional and peer staff in all aspects of the writing process, from brain-storming to final polish. Walk-in tutoring is also offered in subjects such as chemistry, literature, and psychology.



Academic Computing Lab Elston 529, 530

Open weekdays, evenings, and Saturdays when classes are in session, with lab assistants to help students with computers, printers, scanners, and wi-fi access.



Begley Library

Walk-in research assistance, group study spaces in the Academic Studio, quiet study spaces, computer workstations with printers wi-fi, online help from College librarians, and print and online magazines, newspapers and scholarly journals.



Tutor Services, Begley 210

One-to-one hour-long sessions for up to three subjects scheduled once-a-week. Work with a tutor on clarifying concepts, practicing problems, and identifying best study strategies.

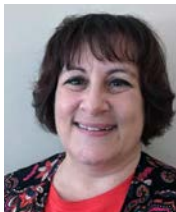
Lauren Gallo, Smart Transfer Early College High School Success Coach

Taunya Hannibal-Williams, Chief Diversity Officer and Title IX Coordinator

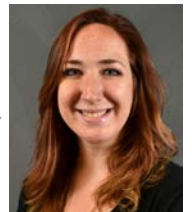
Previously, Taunya worked for the New York State Bar Association, the Anti-Defamation League, and operated her own consulting business. She holds her Juris

Spotlight on Science: Students work in labs at Cornell University, French university

Nkeiru Ubadike likens herself to a theory in physics in which a system can be in multiple states at once until it's measured. "For me, that means, I have all of these cultures - Jamaican, Irish, American, Nigerian - I'm all of them, all at once," the Math/ Science major explained, noting that she was born in Mount Vernon, N.Y., moved to County Longford, Ireland, at the age of six, then back to the U.S. almost a year ago. "Some of the cultures become more prominent I guess, depending on the situations that I'm in or where I am," she added.

Nkeiru discovered in secondary school in Ireland that physics was where her passion lies. "The work itself requires a lot of creativity," she said. "There is a satisfaction in getting a solution when all you had was a problem. Having the answer is satisfying."

Her zest for problem-solving led her to Cornell University this summer, working alongside a Cornell graduate student as part of the eight-week Summer Research for Community College Students program. She investigated a phenomenon known as "decoherence," the first time she conducted an investigation of that magnitude. Cornell faculty, lab staff, program leaders, and students asked her to prove her findings during a large poster presentation at the conclusion of the program.

Back at SUNY Schenectady, Nkeiru is busy as a student in the Collegiate Science and Technology Entry Program (C-STEP) at the College and as a member of the Women's Crew Team (getting up every day at 4:30 a.m. for practice). Fluent in English, Gaelic, and French, after SUNY Schenectady, Nkeiru plans to transfer on for her bachelor's degree and then move to France for a year before going on to earn her Master's degree and Ph.D. in physics or a related science.



Elizabeth Rivera, Science major, at Paul Sabatier University at Toulouse in France this summer. Elizabeth, a Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation Program (LSAMP) scholar, participated in the 2018 France/USA International Research Experience for Undergraduates (iREU) Workshop Conference in

Translational Chemistry, with Dr. Lorena Harris of the Division of Math, Science, Technology and Health. SUNY Schenectady is the first community college to participate. Elizabeth connected with other REU students, attended chemistry lectures, and shadowed a laboratory in the Paul Sabatier University.

Important visit by Middle States Chair next month, College forum scheduled

The College will welcome Dr. Charlene M. Dukes, Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) Visiting Team Chair, to campus on Monday, October 15, for her first visit in the College’s reaccreditation process.

Dr. Dukes will be visiting with key constituents of the College community and assessing SUNY Schenectady’s readiness for the self-study process. She will speak with members of President’s Council, Provost’s Council, the Middle States Steering Committee, and the Board of Trustees.

Her visit will include a campus-wide meeting at 1:30 p.m. in Stockade Building 101 for members of the College community to learn more about the reaccreditation process, and for Dr. Dukes to get to know students, faculty, and staff as she prepares her MSCHE team for their campus visit in March 2019.

Dr. Dukes is the eighth and first female president of Prince George’s Community College in Largo, Maryland. She is Board Chair of the American Association of Community Colleges, as well as a Member of Board of Directors for the Institute for Higher Education Policy (IHEP), President’s Round Table, National Council on Black American Affairs, Prince George’s County Chamber of Commerce, Greater Prince George’s Business Roundtable, Harlem Renaissance Foundation, Community Foundation of the National Capital Region, and Meyer Foundation.

Edmund McTernan, Executive Director of Human Resources

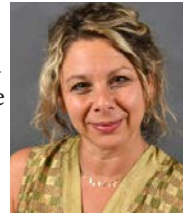
